The program, funded by the Turkish government, was established to expand cultural, educational and dialogue collaborations between Turkey and the United States. The program is designed to promote mutual understanding among Americans and the Turkish society, to introduce and provide a broad exposure to Turkish

educational, cultural, political, economic and social issues, and to allow participants to gain understanding and awareness of national security, foreign policy, trade, health, finance, media, government affairs, religious diversity, minority rights and other achievements of the contemporary Turkish society. Chief Fallaw is extremely proud to have represented the town of North, the South Carolina Police Chiefs Association, the state of South Carolina and the United States in this endeavor.

The delegation traveled to Istanbul initially, then to Konya, Kayseri and Izmir.


